When we live in the Sweet Spot of knowing that Jesus is always with us while we are here and knowing that when we are called home, Jesus will continue to be with us, makes life pretty delicious.

In this time of uncertainty, we are all out of routines that are normal. Questions of purpose and meaning emerge. But this much is true. Before Covid and during Covid and after Covid, one thing remains constant: we now "live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor." Whether we go out to work everyday or work from home staring out the same window, whether we are masked and gloved for shopping, or are playing in the backyard, we belong to the Lord. He is with us. In the run up to Holy Week, most of our churches had their hands full working out all the kinks of streaming worship. That, in and of itself, required a great deal of creativity, trial and error, patience, and quick learning of new skills. With a month or so to get things figured out, we did our best to have some semblance of normalcy to our worship services.

Now that the frenzy of Easter has passed, our minds are turning to bigger questions. As we imagine what our "new normal" may be, for an, as yet, indefinite amount of time, a number of new challenges arise. Are we prepared for extended home-schooling or distance learning for Sunday School and Confirmation?

How can we better equip parents for faith formation, while also recognizing that many are already stretched almost to breaking? What are the most effective tools for Bible study at a distance? How will the skills and practices we are developing now continue to be useful when things are "back to normal"?

This time has also forced us to articulate more clearly our understanding of the sufficiency of the Word, faithful administration of the sacraments, the two kingdoms, stewardship, and countless other matters. A variety of practices have arisen as the churches of our district seek to carry out their missions under the current restrictions. Sometimes those practices have arisen out of careful reflection,

and sometimes decisions are made on the fly as the situation demands.

The Board for Christian Education seeks to be useful to congregations by sharing best practices, tools, and resources. In the coming weeks and months, through the District website and newsletter we will share materials related to Sunday School, Confirmation, Bible study, Stewardship, Worship, Holy Communion, the Two Kingdoms, and other matters that arise. One of our first planned offerings is a webinar discussing communion practices. Watch for more information.

In these times of disruption it is all too easy to become overwhelmed with the sheer number of questions and concerns that come our way. It is also all too easy to feel all alone in sorting everything out. Part of our commitment in the Augustana District is that we never want churches to feel alone or adrift. You have partners all over the district who are working on the same questions you are.

Your Augustana District has been in an official partnership with the Tabor Congregation of Hawassa, Ethiopia since 2014. Tabor, a member congregation of the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus

(EECMY), is among the largest congregations of the EECMY, with over 8,000 members. Our partnership, however, is not in direct support of Tabor as a worshipping community. Rather, we are partners in the outreach ministry of the congregation.

Their strong passion for evangelism would be the envy of any of our congregations. The outreach of Tabor is in both city and rural areas, all strategically planned for predominantly Muslim areas. Our partnership is primarily in helping with the modest salaries (average of \$150 per month) of the lay evangelists that

> are sent out from Tabor to establish preaching points to bring the Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ to lost souls. These evangelists try to work themselves out of their call! That is, once the Gospel takes root in an area and a local believer can be raised up

and teach to his/her fellow tribe or home area.



Two Immediate Ways to Partner with Tabor's Outreach:

First, be an Outreach Champion! As their outreach ministry is ever growing, we can always use additional prayer and financial partners to enable more to come to saving faith in Jesus. So, I ask you to be an Outreach Champion in your church, that you, and your congregation would consider a designated gift through the Augustana District of \$75 per month to support one-half of the salary of one of these dedicated evangelists.

Second, support the Motorcycle Project! In

this calendar year of 2020, we are championing the Motorcycle Project to raise an additional \$8.000 to purchase four motorcycles to aid in the



deployment of Tabor's evangelists, and for visitation and training by the Evangelist Coordinators. When we are able to be out from the Covid-19 restrictions, all of us will want to reconnect with others. Then, you could consider using a Thrivent Action Team grant to purchase materials and promote a fund-raising event within your congregation or community. The

\$250 grant provided as a benefit to Thrivent members will in most cases cover all of the event expenses, so that all the proceeds can be dedicated to support the Motorcycle Project.

I thank you in advance for considering these projects as part of your Gospel Outreach into the world! God Bless you and yours!!

QUESTIONS DURING THIS PANDEMIC

WHAT ARE WE TO DO?

This seems to be the question most pastors and parishioners are asking. The Covid-19 crisis has altered our lives in profound ways, not the least of which involves church life and practice. "What are we to do?" It is not that we are seeking some "right" answer for an unprecedented time. However, some

mutual conversation and theological discernment would be helpful. As a district dedicated to such matters, it seems appropriate that we help provide leadership and guidance in this way and for this time. Some of this began with the Covid-19 resources on our website. We wish to extend this in this newsletter and through continuing communications. Thank you to Board of Theology

and Ministry Chair, Pastor Culynn Curtis, and Board of Christian Education Chair, Pastor Julie Smith, ffor their contributions to this and upcoming newsletters.

One "What are we to do?" question centers around communion practices in a time of state "shelter in place" orders and CDC guidelines. Along with this, the profound economic impact of the Covid-19 crisis has caused churches to grapple with the CARES Act. What are the merits and cautions of accessing government money for church workers'/pastors' salaries?

These are conversations we need to have.

"What are we to do?" is also a Biblical question. It is interesting and perhaps instructive that Jesus was asked exactly that question in John 6:28. It followed the feeding of the 5000 and led up to his promise that "I am the Bread of Life." His simple answer to the question, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?" was, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." It is certainly the case that in discussing communion practices, we are addressing how saving faith is given and received. When those at the Jordan River asked John the Baptist, "What then shall we do?" (Luke 3:10), his response was all about giving to

others. It is certainly the case that in a time

of economic crisis
and government aid
packages, the people
of God must ask what
giving means as it
relates to our neighbors
and mission partners.

Other "What are we to do?" questions are sure to arise. What will it mean for corporate worship if the CDC group recommendations rise to 50 or 100? Will some churches need to add multiple worship services in order maintain safe social distancing? Will some members still be uncomfortable coming to church and want a livestream option to continue? How can this be addressed pastorally and theologically? When it comes to pastoral care, what kind of support and counseling may be necessary to address the latent anxieties and fears that still lurk as a result of this ordeal? The

emotional, spiritual and psychological effects of the Covid-19 crisis differ from those that come from a single tragic event like a 9/11.

As people whose confidence and faith lies only in Christ Jesus, there is no fear. Yet, there is a need to break through the isolation and confusion by conversation and consolation together. This is one of the very purposes of our

Augustana District.




