#### Devotional

In the northern part of the northern hemisphere, the season of Epiphany coincides with the time of year when we notice that the days are getting longer. As the lectionary marches steadily on to the Transfiguration, the sun hangs a little longer in the sky in the evening and the darkness recedes a little earlier in the morning. We can start to imagine the shape of the landscape as something more than a vast sea of white.

Our scripture readings in the Epiphany season also find us seeing more clearly who Jesus is and what he is up to in the world. As he roams about Galilee, eventually making his way to Judea, he is preaching with authority, casting out demons, healing the sick, bringing the presence of God into the midst of his people. And large crowds of people are impressed by what they see and hear.

But even in this season of increasing light, the darkness is encroaching. The more clearly people see Jesus, the more concerned they become. The demons see it first. "Have you come to destroy us?" But soon that's what everyone will be wondering. Have you come to mess everything up? Have you come to disrupt our plans? Have you come to take what we've worked so hard to accumulate? Have you come to be Lord when we're happy to be our own lords?

When God's Word goes to work on us, we may wonder the same thing. "Does this mean I can't ...?" "Does this mean I have to ...?" "Does this mean I shouldn't ...?" "Does this mean I'm not ...?" At first we may think, "This is great. I can do this. I can be who Jesus calls me to be." But soon enough we are there with those crowds in Galilee, in Jerusalem. Those crowds that start to turn because the demand is too much, the cost is too high. Jesus seems to want everything.

The demons, despite their twisted vision, saw Jesus clearly and they knew it meant an end to them. And when Jesus comes into focus in our sinclouded eyes we figure out the same thing. He's out to get us. He wants to destroy us.

Well...he is out to get you. That much is true. And he is out to destroy the sinner and that is the end of the old you. That's the end of the you that lives in darkness and fear, sin and death. It's the end of the you that isn't sure Jesus is someone you want to have around. But it's just the beginning for the new you,

the one for whom darkness and death, sin and fear are behind you. The one who will finally see clearly, without vision twisted by sin, the God who is for you.

#### Children in India Learn the Meaning of Christmas

The second seminar was organized on 24 December 2021, in Muneer Child Development Center, Kalindi, East Medinipur, West Bengal. A total of 200 children attended the Christmas program. All the children

celebrated Christmas by singing and dancing to carols. The children were also given their Christmas presents. They learned Bible verses related to Christmas and also learned the real meaning of Christmas which is the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are grateful to the Lord that both the seminars went well and all the children and their families are safe. We hope that whatever the children learned in the seminar, they could share with their parents and help in bringing them to Christ.

## The Story of a Mission Start Church



# The Log Church's Journey

Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church of Big Sandy just celebrated 85 years of serving the Lord as a Lutheran church in a rural lake country setting around McGregor, Minnesota. Known as the "Log Church" because of the original log church, which is still being used, it began as a member of the Augustana denomination in Minnesota. Later, in the 1960's they were merged into the Lutheran Church in America (LCA) and then in 1988 they were merged again into the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Throughout these times the congregation served the area much like a Lutheran community church with fulltime and seasonal lake area residents of many Christian faiths attending. In 2019 Grace's pastor left and the ELCA Synod provided an interim minister. With Covid-19 running rampant, Grace stopped inperson services. A Call Committee was formed and after filing a Site Profile with ELCA, began to also look for alternatives. As debates over social issues and ELCA initiatives surfaced, the congregation divided. Church attendance and financial support suffered. There was much discontent with the secular political agenda. Research was conducted and presented on reasons to leave the ELCA and reasons to join another denomination. The two most important issues sought were to find a Bible-centered pastor and to eliminate secular politics in the church. Choices were narrowed down to Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) and North American Lutheran Church (NALC). After much open discussion and presentations by ministers and representatives of the ELCA, LCMC, and NALC, the Church Council, guided by the congregation, decided that the congregation would vote to leave the ELCA and join both LCMC and NALC. Official notice was given to the ELCA Synod Bishop and then Covid-19 again shut everything down. In April 2021 the church was finally able to conduct a first vote, which resulted in an intention to leave and then in a required final second vote, 90 days afterward in July 2021, Grace voted by a margin of 94% to leave the ELCA and join LCMC and NALC. Since that time the church is very pleased with the reception into LCMC and the support they have received. Grace also joined the LCMC Augustana District. The Call Committee is currently busy with LCMC pastoral applicants and pray to have a called minister by the summer. Throughout the journey, Grace has felt the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit. Two pastors have served Grace as Pulpit Supply to keep the church open and new members and visitors are growing the church. God is great and present in our lives.

# Reflections from Ash Wednesday 2021 at University

On the morning of Ash Wednesday last year, Pastor Isaiah Bai and I went to a university in Fargo, ND to serve as witnesses to our Lord Jesus. We planned to use the tradition of the distribution of ashes as a simple exercise to call people to remember the significance of the day.

Given the Covid-19 protocols of the time, we used Q-tips to apply the slurry of ash and oil to each person's forehead. One of us would make the mark of the black cross while declaring "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The other would have the more joyful part of the brief liturgy, announcing to the participant "hear now the good news, Jesus Christ forgives you all of your sins, now and always."

During seventy-five minutes, approximately three hundred people walked by our table in the student union. Perhaps we looked like we were dressed for Halloween in our white albs and purple stoles. Many people passed by with their eyes transfixed upon their mobile phones, while others were in too much of a hurry to even return our friendly greeting. Some said to each other, "Oh yeah, it's Ash Wednesday." Others shared with us that they were either on their way to a church service over the noon hour or would worship later that evening. One small group of students asked us about our church affiliation.

We were thankful that by the end, twenty-nine people had received ashes. One can never know what happened to the seeds that were planted, but one can always trust that the Lord is faithful to those

who go out into the fields. We did receive thanks and encouragement from many of the people who stopped by. They seemed to agree that even a small presence in the public square was helpful.

At the same time, we were curious how some folks would decline the imposition of ashes by politely saying "I'm okay" or "I'm good." The statements are intriguing, to say the least, for those who are theologically-minded. Were we to be rude or in an urgent mood, one of us would want to rush over to that person and say, "No, you're not good - you are under the sentence of death for being the sinner that you are." Without a clear statement about this reality, the person exposed to God's Word has little context, hunger or need for the blessing of forgiveness.

As we preached our sermons in our home congregations that evening, each of us brought this point forward. We can be thankful that our God has revealed to us both a Law that damns and a Gospel that releases. We can see that a philosophy of "I'm okay, you're okay" does not fit alongside the many dangers and accusations of this life. As you enter the season of Lent this year, hear not only the difficult report that you are mere dust, but also the tremendous promise that as a forgiven sinner, you are a confident recipient of the treasures of your Lord Jesus Christ.

We have a dedicated quilting group that meets once a week during the school year and once a month during the summer. They send quilts and devotional materials to Furniture Mission in Sioux Falls, SD, Operation Christmas Joy, and LWR. At graduation, fleece blankets are given to high school seniors, and baby quilts are given at baptisms.
