Unbind Him!

Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go." - John 11:40-44

Life is not always okay. We tend to seek joy to feel happiness, comfort, and meaning, including Mary and Martha, who seek Jesus to come and heal Lazarus, who is ill and close to death. Scripture reveals we are not only close to death but also dead in sin (Ephesians 2:1). When one realizes this death, we claw at the grave and try to free ourselves. Mary and Martha are no different when they scramble to interrupt Jesus' teaching and demand He come to save Lazarus before he dies. We come to Christ with our terms, which we think we have been clever in crafting as though appearing before a court as our own witness and defense.

Mary and Martha are distraught that Lazarus is close to dying. They allow the weight of the law to dig its fingers into their hearts, and they come to Christ with a demand. When He finally tends to Lazarus, He is moved and troubled. He cried to see the hurt that occurred with Lazarus's death and was concerned that His words were of little recognition to the people. He is constantly teaching that He IS life and He is God. Upon hearing the phrase, "If you were here, He would not have died" (John 11:32).

The law apart from Christ is certainly binding, and Lazarus is no exception to this rule. Once he died, the family wrapped him in linen and anointed him with oil. This action completes the understanding that he genuinely is dead according to the law. We truly bind ourselves to sin and cannot free ourselves. We lay at rest and stink of death. We can put on as much perfume (justification of sin) as we want, but we are dead and stink.

That is until a preacher comes and presents the words of forgiveness of sins. Two things occur here. First, God's mercy allows us to ask for forgiveness of sins; second, he restores us through forgiveness. On behalf of Jesus Christ, the preacher stands before the sinner who

is dead in sin and declares, "Lazarus, come out," followed by, "Unbind him!"

These words given by Christ through a preacher remove the sin that binds us and signifies only death. We come out as a new creature without the stench of death, or that stuff that binds us. Although the resurrection of Lazarus is only temporary, we see what Christ has promised. Let

the word of our Lord echo in the ears of the dead, "Come out" and "unbind him!"

This is the Glory of the Lord that you are forgiven of sin, and sin does not confine you to death. You are resurrected and anew in Christ's declaration of life.


REFLECTIONS FROM THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSIONS BY PASTOR PAUL KNUDSON

The fires of conflict can refine you or consume you in the flames. We in America have our own bitter conflicts, but at this point few of us expect our lives to come to horrific ends due to our divisions. We are called to pray earnestly for partners in mission who literally face life and death at the hands of those who seem to place no value in the life of others they assume stand in the way of their wielding power.

The North Central Ethiopia Synod of the Ethiopia Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus is one such Augustana District partner. One AD congregation, Living Word in Moses Lake, WA, is the primary source of funding for the continuing education of pastors and evangelists in this synod. Led by the synod president, Pastor Wagnew Andagre, these servant leaders are growing in their faith and witness.

These leaders and their people, however, are caught in the middle of violence perpetrated by tribal militias and informal military groups, that are striking out in random violence that is putting our partner leaders at great risk. President Wagnew has shared how this can lead to fear and exhaustion for himself and others. I am sure that we can hardly imagine how one's witness could result in your life being snuffed out and your family left in jeopardy.

Pray, dear friends, for these committed servants of our Lord Jesus Christ. Pray that the perpetrators of this violence can be stopped short, turned around, and work for the common good. Pray that our Lord's witness, that has reaped such a magnificent harvest in Ethiopia, will be able to continue moving forward. This is just one center of horrific violence in our painfully troubled world. Our hearts go out to so many who are struggling. Today we unapologetically ask that you lift up the North Central Ethiopia Synod in prayer. Pray without ceasing dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

Women of the Word: Recap Part II.

As a continuation of last month's WOW Gathering recap, we would like to highlight the three speakers in this edition. The first was Pastor Julie Smith, the Coordinator for Districts and Fellowships came with an update from LCMC. She stated that there has been an increase in the number of districts s being formed recently. Less than half of the LCMC congregations are currently a part of a district and an effort is being made to try to connect churches through districts.

The Augustana District continues to stress the importance of Theology, Church and Mission through an annual theological conference, stressing working together on events and the call process and by stewarding a high percent of the district revenue to missions.

LCMC is working on a Strategic Plan that has four parts: 1) Welcoming new churches; 2) Leader care - many pastors are leaving and they are trying to be proactive to work with them; 3) Rejuvenating connections through districts and fellowships by building up, reviving, and creating new ones; 4) Tending to theological commitments so they don't lose their core identity.

LCMC, approaching 1000 congregations, many without pastors, continues to grow and support congregations to remain healthy and theologically sound. Pastor Julie also emphasized the need to keep looking for people that would be interested in becoming pastors.

The second speaker, Pastor Erica
Varcoe is pastor at the Table
Ministry Church that was
planted two years ago in Sioux
Falls. The church meets in the
Shenanigans Bar and even
though some thought it would
only last a couple weeks it has

a large following of adult and youth activities. The church began during the time of

covid when many with community rooms were not allowing them to be used. The bar had a room that they rented out for birthday parties, etc. and were willing to let them use it. Pastor Erica expressed thanks to all who have supported the church and said that it continues to grow. It is a place where sinners gather to be met by the Word of God – the Word that forgives.

Using the example of egg shells, she shared that God comes for the broken so why are we walking on egg shells afraid that someone will find out about our lives. The lost are found and saved. We would rather be lumped with 99 than the one lost sitting at the table of sin and shame. No faking can hide our sin, on the cross Jesus exposed us all. It isn't about us and how we appear, it is about what He has done for us. Trust in the Lord as said in Isaiah. Jesus comes for the imperfect, the wandering sheep, tax collectors and prostitutes. He comes for our failures and our flaws. Hope comes in the empty tomb of Sunday.

Shenanigans is the only bar in Sioux Falls that hires felons and the presence of this ministry has lifted them up. This congregation is touching many lives by giving rides to court, serving lowincome schools, serving at the soup kitchen and just helping those in need. They do not pay rent but they need more space. They have just three paid staff – a secretary, a DJ who runs the tech equipment, and a part time worship leader. The owner of the bar is sick and wants to sell it but no matter what happens the Table Ministry hopes to keep the partnership alive. The offering for the WOW gathering was given to the Table Ministry.

The third speaker, Pastor Jennifer
Bennett from Faith Lutheran in
Castle Rock, CO spoke about
Faith Over Fear. She has recently
returned from a mission trip to
Latvia. In that country all religion
was outlawed from the time of

World War II until the 1990's so they have no older generations of Christians as Latvia was occupied by the Soviets for over 50 years. Exodus 15:2 says "The Lord is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation; this is my God, and I will praise him, my father's God, and I will exalt him" was the theme verse for the gathering. The love of God is only through faith given to us through Him. The Father satisfies our thirst, we drink of the water from the well of salvation. God is worthy of thanks and praise and we need to continue to sing praises to Him.

Pastor Jennifer traveled to Latvia in June with a group of ten people and they worked at what would look like an all day Vacation Bible School which ran Monday through Friday where she was teaching 3-5th graders. Paganism is dominant but Lutheran is a popular religion for those that are coming to faith. Members of the mission team were responsible for their own funding working through SON (Spiritual Orphan Network) which is an approved mission of the LCMC.

AUGUSTANA DISTRICT FINANCIALS

The financial news for October is not great. As of right now, we are at a net loss of \$9,354.04 for the month and a net loss of \$22,008.50 for the fiscal year which ends in March. Last year at this time we were at a net income of \$646.39.

As you can see, expenses are just slightly higher this year, due in part to a new high school retreat and additional service coordinator travel to meet the needs of district congregations.

The number that is more concerning is the Income which is down significantly from last year. This puts the district in a very difficult position as we are trying to be responsive to the increasing needs of our congregations with decreasing financial resources.
